The Corporate Plan	Does the Plan focus on the right things?	The plan is clear and detailed and if I may say so quite ambitious but in a good way!
Please see the document here:-		I think it has the right focus. Can't see anything that should be removed.

		Effort will be needed to link Hanwood Park with the town otherwise it could become a separate entity. This is more than branding as it affects all KTC does. This needs a Committee solely with this in mind to ensure co-ordination. This would feed social media work / branding / events etc.
	Are there things that should be removed from it?	
	Are there things which aren't mentioned but should be?	It's now or never for town centres. Some have bucked the downward trend and lessons need to be learned from the successful towns. At the conference held two years ago, two experts gave their opinions, amongst which was the need for increased internet and social media coverage in the town centre.
		I think there is an opportunity for some work to be carried out collaboratively and in partnership between Kettering Town Council and the other local Town Councils (Desborough, Rothwell etc) as this could provide some economies of scale with shared priorities.

Perhaps jumping ahead but some measuring of impacts/positive outcomes would be useful going forward and demonstrate to your constituents the value of the work the Town council is delivering

Should be more practical actions around sustainable travel and it take into account the many comments already mentioned on the public feedback for the Commonplace consultation about active travel in the town. eg there is a great need and demand for secure cycle parking in the town centre. This and other issues raised by the consultation could be addressed by the town council maybe in collaboration with the unitary.

Should be a budget to cover admin time for the town council to apply for other funds - the budget should look at other income potential like this. Eg OPFCC funding can be applied for by town councils to address road safety issues, lottery funding applications. Also, if these bids are done with community partners it shares the work and strengthens the bids.

Overall I also think there needs to be a bigger focus on bringing people together of all ages, having more events and really strong ties being built with community organisations, schools etc. (The town council has started doing this well with open meetings).

Engagement with the next generation is critical. There should be an objective to engage with the school parliaments or councils to gain input on their views/ any changes. This would be Members time with admin support from the Clerk's team to co-ordinate. Timing would fit in with annual planning for budget/events etc

It seems a pity not to devote some resources to creating a base line to measure activity against. This might be interview time, focus groups on specific subjects etc. This allows us to measure success.

		A key starting point would be what people think of the town now and what could be changed (once again with sensible constraints) The same would apply to understanding the very small green spaces we have and how they can be managed To support the community it would a service to establish and manage a complete list of all organisations that support the third sector. This would be charities, voluntary groups and support groups. The Clerk's office could act as a focus with an allowance for admin time to co-ordinate. This would allow groups to find out what others are doing etc and possibly support each other

Near the existing position would be good, so it serves the park, marketplace area and is at the end of town furthest from the supermarkets and Newland centre loos. However one of the side streets between Horsemarket and the high street could be good too.

This building is currently being readied for a new occupier so there would appear to be an opportunity there. • The vacant building to the north and attached to the existing 'Staffline' building

		If a modular container is pursued, then there would not appear to be a great deal of options although the car parking space between 'Revs' and the former 'Gala' building may be an option for a small facility.
	Should we include other features?	The proposal for male, female and disabled toilets is an outdated model and consideration should be given to a gender neutral toilet as this would cater for non-binary people.

		It strikes me that the first option for location should exhaust the potential for using existing buildings as a steel container (even if clad) would not represent a viable long-term option and is likely to have visual implications as the cladding degrades. This approach may also save on initial monetary outlay.

What sort of work would you like to see our grants scheme support? We haven't written the rules yet and would welcome your thoughts. We are aiming to make grants up to a ceiling of £2500 per project or organization.	What should the grant scheme focus on?	I think the criteria for the grants programme should be as broad as possible whilst being mindful of quality controls and checks to prevent fraudulent applications. It would be good to see included opportunities for pieces of work to be delivered in order to build up evidence of need, thus giving the possibility of longer term sustainability if other funds were attracted on the back of it. The reporting requirement should be proportionate to the amount of grant awarded.

		It's not just young people who use drugs and are ASB problems; however more needs to be done for young people to give them opportunities, reduce boredom, give them focus, good interests and purpose.

		Special effort needed for the teatime/twilight hours in town centre to bring some life to it and make it feel safer.

Planting trees and encouraging bio-diversity.	Where should trees be planted to have best effect.	Planting trees is easy. The difficult part is the maintaining, pruning, watering, leaf disposal. Too many of Kettering's once fine trees are now a disgrace: the broad-leave limes just seem to drop leaves and ooze sap over everything. Careful selection of more suitable urban species is essential, so bear in mind the long-term implications. If it's carbon trapping that is the main priority, there are other schemes that are more efficient. You could also stop mowing the 'meadows'

We need more trees but they have to be well thought out and complement rather than cause conflict with active travel schemes. Eg planting a tree where a cycle path needs to go is not so eco. Also need right kind of trees depending on the spot eg not crab apple right next to cycle Lane like in St Mary's road unless the apples and leaves can be regularly cleared away to stop slipping. Also trees are better than bushes in terms of feeling of safety and openness.

Funding for tree planting is positive, however there is a disappointingly excessive focus on tree planting from all Parties as a means of sequestering carbon, offsetting carbon emissions and improving biodiversity locally, with no complimentary funding drive for wildflower meadow creation in evidence. Tree planting must be balanced by wider habitat enhancement through wildflower planting, meadowland, and pollinator bank creation where possible, or by designing tree planting sites in such a way to incorporate rides, glades and clearings that are well stocked with nectar sources and foodplants for a variety of invertebrate species. Recommended resources:-

'Right Tree, Right Place – Why There is More to Tree Planting than Meets the Eye', which provides context on tree planting and the suitability of landscapes to accommodate planting schemes,

objectives of the <u>Grasslands+ Initiative</u>, which demonstrates the importance of grassland in combating climate change and improving biodiversity,

Review <u>Plantlife's Road Verge campaign</u>, which presents an opportunity to connect grassland habitats (e.g. wildflower meadows) via pollinator corridors – the species-rich roadside verges – and therefore provide invertebrates such as butterflies and bees with a means of travelling between otherwise inaccessible, fragmented habitats across the council's jurisdiction, and

Assess whether <u>butterfly banks can be created</u> on grassland in areas where tree planting is deemed unsuitable, or on new developments as an alternative to domination by amenity grassland.

		The council must debate investing not just in the purchase, planting and upkeep of trees, but also grassland cultivation, nutrient enrichment, preservation and improvement of existing grassland sites, wildflower seeding and plug planting of native flowering plants to benefit local pollinators that will experience no benefit from tree planting. 76% of butterflies have seen a decline in abundance, occurrence, or both in the UK since 1976, and it is imperative that steps are taken to reverse this trend. The UK has lost 97% of its meadows since 1945. Species-rich grassland has been proven to retain as much – if not more – carbon than woodland. Wildflower meadow creation is therefore just as important locally as tree planting as a climate change objective. The council must consider the importance of such sites and increase the total area of land prescribed as such, either through the conversion of amenity grassland, improvement of scrubland, reclamation of wasteland, or other means, and consider the worth of designating sites as wildflower meadows or matrixes of habitats instead of tree planting sites alone. I encourage discussion concerning whether funds can be distributed evenly between these two complimentary initiatives – tree planting and meadow creation – that will

		I think this is a great opportunity to do lots of good things in the town that can involve everyone. The town council needs to keep working closely with community groups to support each other. Also need to seek out other resources/funds so more can be done. I am very keen to see cycling, walking, scooting, skating, bus travel etc all promoted and
		supported much much more throughout the town. Good cycle storage facilities, better

seating, cycling access to high street, (council encouraging) strong police presence and crackdown on cycle thefts is really key.
Finally, for the last three years I have been reaching out to both councils with a proposal to develop an accredited town centre travel plan which brings together all the existing initiatives and supports plans for more. There is funding available towards this. Our social enterprise (Brightwayz) has done/is doing this for other sites eg local schools, Wicksteed, Rushden Lakes, KGH and it would really help the town centre if we could do it there too. However this is something that would need the support of the town council as good partnership engagement is key.
