2	Welcome from the Mayor
	The Mayor welcomed everyone to the meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to understand what was already being provided for young people (largely in the 8-16 year bracket) and to consider how best to improve

engagement, awareness and participation, and what gaps might exist in provision.

The Mayor gave a summary of what the Town Council was already providing itself and also later in the meeting, a summary of the views expressed at a young persons' forum she had convened at Tresham College earlier this month. (The notes of this forum are held on the Council's website as part of the papers for this meeting)

Questions were put to the speakers after each presentation.

The Mayor summarised the feedback from 13 young people who had met at Tresham College earlier in February. Three priorities had emerged from that discussion

- 1. Friday Film Night at the Kettering Arts Centre
- 2. Youth Club at the Woodcroft Scout Centre
- 3. Create a basketball club at Tresham

and all three were now being explored.

4 Discussion

After the presentations, themed discussion groups considered what they had heard and what might be done differently in future.

It was recognised that volunteering and participation in more formal activity sessions (i.e. scouting, cadets etc) built employability, transferable social skills, confidence and resilience amongst young people.

A level of synergy between providers could be achieved by groups working closer together and cross referring; cross advertising what was available.

The main thematic considerations arising from the discussion groups were:-

Sport

Known areas of need :-

- A desire for better swimming facilities particularly for groups with particular needs and the ability to make more intensive use of existing swimming pool space
- A desire for better MUGA or all weather facilities including for basketball – one example being potential lighting improvements to the Mill Rd MUGA.

Fun things to do; Places to go/ youth clubs

A variety of ideas were mooted

- Some form of "youth club" type facility, which could combine theatre, disco, ITC and science activities, drop in and general play

Reference was made to existing activities which could be more widely accessed

- Green Rangers at Greenpatch
- Methodist Youth Connection

There was scope with existing venues – St Andrews Arts Centre – when it was back in action – to accommodate more bookings

Transport

The (un)availability of public or community transport to access venues, or activities was widely known, and cycling to venue was still not felt to be a safe means of getting around on main roads. It was recognised that, longer term, a better cycling network would be helpful. In the meantime, exploring how community transport services could be expanded would be beneficial.

Communication and engagement

The importance of engaging young people so that their voice was helping design services and activities. BHVA had accumulated a great deal of knowledge and awareness from their outreach into what young people said they wanted, which could be more widely shared. Getting information in front of family members was also an effective but under -used way of reaching young people

Awareness of what was available and how to access it was low. Using existing structures – schools, youth clubs, websites, venues, to cross advertise services and activities should be explored by everyone. Having information available to new residents – e.g. through estate agents and lettings agents - would also help build awareness amongst families not just young people.

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Meeting closed at 9 pm
Communicating via social media was not necessarily a default medium for young people and old fashioned printed leaflets were often the best means of advertising
